

It seeks to provide a platform for children to realise their full potential, their right to a safe and secure space, education, and health and nutrition.





Vision

SBT aims at creating a nurturing environment that can foster the physical and mental growth of street and working children in difficult circumstances.




Rescue Operations

Medical Programme



Children on the streets live in unsanitary conditions and are prone to various infections and diseases. Therefore, regular medical check-ups of the children are done at the full-care Residential Centres and Contact Points. Individual health cards are maintained for each child. Whenever required, pathological tests are conducted as per the recommendation of the doctors.

We have a full-time doctor employed at SBT solely for this purpose. Apart from that, we also invite external doctors or get the children treated by specialists at hospitals. Children are regularly vaccinated against Hepatitis-B and Tetanus. Also, the health camps are organised at the Contact Points to strengthen awareness and support the basic health needs of the communities.


To meet the nutritional needs of children, nutritionally balanced and hot-cooked meals are served at the Residential Centres and Contact Points. The meals are prepared in the kitchen space provided at the centre under the supervision of staff members to ensure safe and hygienic practices. In some cases, children have special nutritional requirements due to illnesses such as tuberculosis and malnutrition. Such children are provided with special nutrition, including protein supplements, and additional servings of fruits and milk, as prescribed by the doctor.



Regular Doctor Visits and Need-based care and treatment

SBT has a dedicated medical team, including a full-time physician. The homes and contact points where the children reside and work benefit from regular monthly visits by the doctor, enabling the identification and treatment of any health issues or concerns.

Children receive care and treatment tailored to their individual needs, ensuring they receive appropriate medical attention and interventions based on their specific health conditions.



Health Camps

Vaccination

SBT recognizes the critical role that vaccinations play in preventing the spread of infectious diseases. Accordingly, the organization is committed to ensuring that every child receives all essential immunizations in accordance with recommended schedules.



Mental Health

SBT launched a well-structured Mental Health Programme (MHP) in February 2003. It started with a core group of four members, headed by Dr. Amit Sen, (MD - Psychiatry, MRC Psych, London; Specialist, Training in Child & Adolescent Psychiatry, UK). Over time, the team extended further and at present, comprises an able and qualified group of nine counseling psychologists, two special educators and three consultant psychiatrists from children first.

The Mental Health Programme was started with a vision to promote and enhance positive mental health in the children/adolescents of Salaam Baalak Trust.

Objectives

- Early identification and management of mental health/behavioral problems in children and adolescents
- To increase awareness about mental health issues in staff as well as children using both individual and group work
- Preventive work with children to reduce risk-taking behaviour
- Create a more sustainable environment for children with special needs

Mental Health Program Overview

- Provides comprehensive mental health support for children.
- Referral work ensures appropriate interventions for moderate to severe psychological issues through assessments, psychiatric consultations, and psychotherapy.
- Individual counseling addresses mild emotional concerns and offers psychosocial support.
- Life skills education fosters emotional, social, and cognitive growth, promoting confidence and decision-making.

- Career counseling guides youth in academic and vocational choices, reducing dropouts and improving employability.
- Group sessions use creative approaches to address bullying, substance abuse, anger management, empathy, personality development, and emotional coping.
- Special education and vocational training support children with neurodevelopmental disabilities.
- The Child Development Unit at Aasra Children Home provides 24/7 care, special education, and therapies for 10 children with neurodevelopmental disabilities.
- Community outreach offers counseling for children and families at contact points.
- Capacity-building workshops strengthen staff skills in child mental health support.



Mental Health



SBT's achievements at a glance

- Girl beneficiaries constituted 32 percent of the total outreach, with 3,723 girls benefiting from various programmes.
- A total of 128 children (including 109 girls) were admitted to vocational training and skill development courses.
- Sixty children (including 42 girls) were successfully placed in jobs after completing their training.
- A total of 505 new children were admitted to schools through all SBT centers.
- During the year, 395 volunteers from different parts of the world contributed their time and effort to support SBT's initiatives.

- **Restoration and Follow-up Programme:**

- Physical follow-up was conducted for 280 restored children across Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Delhi/NCR, and Jharkhand. These children were linked with various social protection schemes and provided counselling support. Additionally, telephonic follow-up was done for 167 children.
- Social protection support facilitated included: Ayushman Cards (588), Aadhaar Cards (108), school admissions and educational support (101), PAN Cards (87), domicile certificates (86), bank accounts (41), income certificates (30), ABHA Cards (22), caste certificates (19), widow pensions (19), birth certificates (10), ration cards (10), labour cards (5), sponsorships (4), disability certificates (3), death certificates (3), Arthik Labh Yojna (2), and Mukhya Mantri Bal Seva Yojna (1).



- Children and families were connected with various social protection schemes across all SBT centers, including: Aadhaar Cards (662), new school admissions (404), bank accounts (367), ABHA Cards (252), birth certificates (219), Sukanya Yojana enrolments (154), voter IDs (96), scholarships under EDUMEDHA (83), PAN Cards (44), E-Shram Cards (41), Pradhan Mantri Matri Bandhan Yojna (38), Anganwadi enrolments (29), Mahila Samman Yojna (23), family planning beneficiaries (18), sponsorships (17), Ladli Yojana (13), disability certificates (11), PM Vishwakarma Yojna (11), widow support (9), death certificates (7), ration cards (4), widow pensions (3), driving licences (3), caste certificates (2), old age pensions (2), disability pension (1), PM Svanidhi Yojna (1), and daughter marriage scheme for widows (1).
- Under the City Walk initiative, 762 walks were conducted, welcoming 4,678 visitors from different parts of the world.
- A total of 165 children from SBT contact points participated in a five-day educational tour at Sattal, Nainital, as part of the annual exposure programme.
- SBT's annual theatre production titled Two Wolves had seven performances across Delhi, Gurugram, and Ghaziabad.
- A compensation amount of ₹12,49,613 was secured for 13 children involved in child labour cases (DMRC Home for Boys).



- The inauguration of Udaan DMRC Girls' Children Home took place on 8 March 2025, on the occasion of International Women's Day. The event was graced by Mr. Tokhan Sahu, Central State Minister, along with the Managing Director and Directors of the Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC).
- Arushi Children Home was renamed as Praveen Nair Home for Girls. The renaming ceremony, held on 12 February 2025, was attended by the Nair family, including Mira Nair.
- A one-week training programme was organised in Palampur in November 2024, where 15 teachers and the Education Coordinator participated in a workshop on experiential Mathematics and Science. The workshop focused on hands-on learning approaches designed to spark curiosity, nurture creativity, and promote critical thinking among students.
- A three-day youth job training boot camp was jointly organised by SBT, Udayan Care, and CHETNA on 13 March 2025.




Aasra Children home for Boys

'Aasra' literally translates into a safe shelter. SBT's 'Aasra Shelter' is a Children's Home for 50 boys. Over the years, the Founder-Trustees realised that just providing daycare services wasn't helping the Trust realise its end goal, i.e. rehabilitation of street children. Whatever was learnt and built during the day was unlearnt and undone at night when the dark underbelly comes alive. So, in 1993, the first 24X7 residential programme, with a focus on education, mental health care, and skill-building, was initiated as Aasra CHB. The home provides a comprehensive package of services to the children, laying the foundation for their transformation into productive and responsible adults. Embracing an inclusive approach, the team at Aasra CHB strives for the all-round development of all children without any discrimination. Aasra also houses SBT's much-acclaimed, unique Child-Development Unit (CDU), a safe space for children on the autism spectrum. In collaboration with Children First, the CDU caters to 10 boys who are provided therapy, special school education and skill development.



Overview of Aasra Children Home for Boys







DMRC Children Home for Boys

The construction of the Delhi Metro meant the displacement of several families, especially families who lived on the streets. With compassion for the children, the then Managing Director, Mr. Sridharan, came forward with a plan for the children living on the streets and in distressed situations. In 2010, SBT was invited to partner with this plan which consisted of taking care of a Children's Home large enough to house 125 boys.


One of the largest Children's Homes in the city, DMRC CHB, ensures that every child in its care receives every opportunity to grow and develop into capable and contributing citizens. Going beyond care and protection, the DMRC CHB team also provides skill development services for holistic and all-around development. The home is run by a professional team, comprising a coordinator, counsellor, medical social worker, and social workers.

- DMRC handled all aspects of the SBT Annual Play ("Two Wolves"), ensuring the event was conducted smoothly and without any inconvenience.
- Students participated in the Annual Sports Meet at Tyagraj Stadium, securing an impressive total of six silver medals and four gold medals.
- A documentary focusing on the Street Cricket World Cup, titled "Cricket Dreams", was produced and nominated at the 8th New Delhi Film Festival.
- SBT facilitated access to several social protection schemes, enabling the issuance of 110 Aadhaar cards, opening of 175 bank accounts, and restoration of Aadhaar cards for seven special needs beneficiaries.


Praveen Nair center for Girls /Aarushi

Aarushi Shelter Home was the first full care centre catering to the needs of girls rescued from the streets. They long for a safe and secure space where they can sleep peacefully during the night.


Since 1999, Aarushi CHG has been providing a safe and child-friendly space for girls rescued from the streets and distressed situations in and around Gurugram. The Home provides shelter to 50 girls at any given time. It is well-equipped with all the facilities and amenities such as classrooms, a play area, dormitories, and a computer lab among others. Aarushi Centre remains one of the model child-care institutions operational in Haryana. It functions under the provisions of the Juvenile Justice Act and comes under the jurisdiction of the Child Welfare Committee of Gurugram, Haryana.




The Udaan Children's Home for Girls in Dilshad Garden was set up in March 2010 with the generous support of Give2Asia to provide shelter and care for girls rescued from the streets and other distressing circumstances. While working with street children, the Salaam Baalak Trust (SBT) team observed that many girls from remote villages and hamlets end up on city streets after going missing, running away, or being trafficked. Living alone on the streets exposes them to severe risks including violence, abuse, and exploitation. Udaan offers these girls a safe, nurturing, and child-friendly space where their immediate needs for shelter and protection are met, while also focusing on education, life skills, and rehabilitation. The program aims to empower them to build independent, dignified futures through access to education, counselling, and opportunities for meaningful livelihood.






Apnaghar Open Shelter

The journey of a child from the streets to a residential centre is often difficult. Accustomed to freedom and self-reliance, these children see themselves as masters of their own lives. Having faced abuse and violence, they are wary of anyone trying to help. They choose their freedom over discipline and a set pattern of life without realising that a Children's Home or Residential Centre will provide them with the essential services to lead a normal life.

For many such children, direct enrolment in a full-care residential centre is often challenging. To offset this problem, SBT initiated an open shelter called Apna Ghar in 2000. The centre initially started as a drop-in centre but now as the name 'Apna Ghar' implies, it is an open shelter which children can call their own. The centre functions in the crowded area of Paharganj. As an open shelter, it provides short-stay facilities to boys rescued from difficult circumstances. Due to its proximity to the New Delhi Railway Station, many of the beneficiaries are children who have lived on the streets, in and around the railway station. Even though children stay at the centre for a shorter duration, the centre offers them non-formal education, computer classes, vocational training, and career counselling. The team works relentlessly to minimise children's emotional trauma through psychological counselling and support. They also work round the clock to trace missing children's families and rehabilitate them in their homes across different parts of the country. At any given time, the centre supports 40 boys


Old Delhi Railway Station (ODRS) Open Shelter

The Old Delhi Railway Station (ODRS) area is known for clandestine petty crimes, human trafficking, and drug smuggling. The area is also a hot spot for local criminal gangs operating through street children. Finding security in togetherness, many of these children fall prey to physical, sexual, and substance abuse. The majority of children living in marginalised situations, in and around Old Delhi Railway Station, do not go to schools because they either work as child labourers, child beggars or while away their time on the streets due to parent and family neglect. Another aspect is that girls are forced to babysit younger siblings and look after the house while parents are at work. Further, a number of these children, even after getting enrolled in schools, are not able to continue their education as they find it difficult to cope with academic pressure in the absence of educational support at home. Being first-generation learners is difficult for young children. In addition, they face discrimination by teachers and school administration on the account of socio-economic background.

In these challenging circumstances, SBT initiated an Open Shelter with a capacity of 25 boys. The team works very closely with Childline ODRS and the contact point in the vicinity to identify new children coming to the area and other children in need of care and protection. Another focus of the team is to act as a halfway house for children struggling with substance abuse. The centre acts as a safe space for pre as well as post-de-addiction counselling and support.



Established in January 2018, Uday Open Shelter is located near Ghaziabad Railway Station, an area that has increasingly become a key transit point for traffickers and runaway children. With child protection services being strengthened at New Delhi and Old Delhi Railway Stations, many vulnerable children and traffickers now prefer to get off a few stops earlier. Consequently, Ghaziabad Railway Station has emerged as a new hotspot for such activities, highlighting the need for continuous vigilance and timely intervention by child protection services in the region.

Contact Points and Community Outreach

A segment of Delhi's population lives on the streets or in slum areas spread across Delhi. These are vulnerable children open to trafficking and abuse. Our social and outreach workers strive hard to build bonds of trust and friendship with them, their peers and families. We motivate them to attend our programmes at our many Contact Points where they have access to education, medical aid, a healthy meal, life skills, and the opportunity of realising their full potential.



Kishalaya contact point (Hanuman Mandir)

Kishalaya, situated near Bangla Sahib Gurudwara in Connaught Place, serves as a hub for various community services. One of its key initiatives is a day care center that addresses the educational and medical needs of children living on the streets or in rain baseras (night shelters). The center not only provides nutritious lunches but also aims to enroll these children in formal schools.

Encouraging parents to send their children to school is a significant challenge, as many depend on their children's income from selling balloons to support the family. However, the dedicated team at Kishalaya works tirelessly to earn the trust of these parents. They recognize the value of education and strive to persuade families of its long-term benefits for their children.

Additionally, Kishalaya addresses the issue of drug addiction among children. Assisting them in overcoming this addiction requires immense perseverance and determination. The team engages with these children, offering support and guidance to help them break free from substance abuse. They implement various rehabilitation strategies, fully aware of the considerable challenges involved.



Achievements

- A special survey was organised by Salaam Baalak Trust, Kishalaya Centre, in collaboration with other partner organisations, under the guidance of Indu Prakash and Sunil Kumar Aledia. Conducted in Delhi from August 27 to August 31, 2024, the survey aimed to gain a comprehensive understanding of the conditions of homeless individuals and the extent of homelessness in the city. Over five nights, the survey identified 154,369 homeless individuals across various locations in Delhi.
- The Sangeet Natak Akademi provided SBT children with an opportunity to participate in the Prime Minister's programme. A total of 72 children from the Kishalaya Centre took part, out of 120 participants from all three contact points.
- Children and families were successfully connected with various social protection schemes, resulting in the issuance of 65 Aadhaar cards, 29 bank accounts, 13 PAN cards, 1 disability card, 4 birth certificates, 39 voter IDs, 2 driving licences, and 22 ABHA cards.


GRP and Platform contact point

The GRP is situated at the busy New Delhi Railway Station, a central point for children who have fled their small towns, arriving in Delhi with dreams of a hopeful new life. Unfortunately, the reality they encounter often contrasts sharply with their expectations. To tackle this challenge, SBT's outreach team begins its work early each morning, diligently checking trains for children who have run away, been abandoned, are lost, or have fallen victim to trafficking.

The main objective is to ensure the safety and well-being of these at-risk children. For those who can be reunited with their families, SBT team work diligently to facilitate their return. For those who cannot be immediately reunited, we partner with residential homes in Delhi to provide a safe and nurturing environment. These homes offer stability, care, and protection, along with access to education, healthcare, and emotional support.

Child help desk (Old Delhi Railway Station)

At Old Delhi Railway Station, Salaam Baalak Trust runs the ODRS Child Help Desk, reaching 100–140 children every month who arrive at the station scared, lost, or alone. With a team of six dedicated social workers, children are gently identified, comforted, and protected from risks such as exploitation and trafficking. Each child is first given what they need most—food, clean clothes, medical care, and emotional support. The team then works closely with the railway police and Child Welfare Committee to ensure safety, shelter, and, whenever possible, a safe reunion with their family. Many children are referred by alert railway staff, while others are found by the outreach team during daily rounds. Through constant presence and compassion, Salaam Baalak Trust helps turn moments of fear into steps toward safety and hope.


Achievements

- Two missing children were successfully traced through information received during Google visits, leading to their safe recovery.
- Eight Missing FIRs were registered to ensure prompt follow-up and coordination with concerned authorities.
- Six POCSO FIRs were filed to address cases involving sexual offences against children, ensuring legal action and child protection measures.

Mobile School

A Sarv Shiksha Abhiyan project of the government of the National Capital Territory of Delhi prompted Salaam Baalak Trust Delhi to approach urban communities to meet the existing challenges in elementary education. In 2011, SBT innovated and took our mobile school and its facilities to those who couldn't leave their locality and attend regular school programmes.

The Mobile School programme covers children in the urban slum areas of Seelampur and Shastri Park. At each of its three stops, the van spends two hours in activities, including non-formal education, creative arts, counselling on health, hygiene, social skills, and child rights. At the end of each session, supplementary nutrition is provided, and a medical aid service is made available.






ODRS contact point (Unnati)



Child Well Being (CWB) Raghbir Nagar center

The Child Wellbeing Centre in Raghbir Nagar serves as a beacon of hope and support for the vulnerable children residing in low-income communities, slums, JJ settlements, and those living on the streets. Established on May 2nd, 2023, with a dedicated team of 04 members, this centre embodies a holistic approach towards the care, protection, and development of these children. Nestled within the community facility complex in B block Raghbir Nagar, Raghbir Nagar, predominantly inhabited by migrants from Gujarat, has been a home to its residents for over a decade. However, most families engage in hawking (Feri work) and Begging and rag picking work, and children are often found involved in rag-picking and begging, highlighting the dire need for intervention and support.




Child Well Being (CWB) Model Town center





Cradle to Career (C2C), Seelampur center




After Care program

Upon turning 18, a child's relationship with SBT doesn't end; it transitions into continued support and care. While they legally become adults at 18, many are not yet ready for independent living. We offer financial assistance for further education and provide housing in our aftercare home.

Even after rehabilitation, we maintain regular communication with these young adults through monthly phone calls to assess their current needs and offer any necessary support.

Salaam Citywalk

Salaam City Walk is a guided two-hour tour conducted by former street children and alumni of Salaam Baalak Trust. The walk takes visitors through the narrow lanes of Paharganj and the New Delhi Railway Station area, offering an authentic glimpse into the lives and challenges faced by street and working children. It seeks to sensitize participants to the harsh realities of urban poverty while showcasing inspiring stories of resilience and transformation. The initiative was started in 2006 by John Thompson, a volunteer from the United Kingdom, and continues to serve as a powerful platform for awareness and empowerment.

- CITYWALK currently offers three guided tours – the New Delhi City Walk, Old Delhi Food Walk, and Mehrauli Heritage Walk.
- World Tourism Day was celebrated in Jaipur in collaboration with GX India, hosting 500 participants for the City Walk over the course of one week.

Volunteers Program

During the year, 348 new volunteers joined the organisation, including 8 from overseas, adding to the existing team of 47 dedicated volunteers—bringing the total to 395.

Volunteers played a vital role in advancing several key initiatives. A notable highlight was the publication of *Desolation to Dreams*, a book authored by one of our interns. The publication beautifully captures the resilience of children at Aarushi Homes and reflects the trust's mission through powerful storytelling. The organisation also collaborated with interns from over 26 colleges across India, continuing to foster a culture of compassion, empathy, and social responsibility among youth.



Case Studies

Bridging the Gap Back to School

During an outreach initiative at the New Delhi Railway Station, Salaam Baalak Trust (SBT) identified 12-year-old Nanki Kumari (name changed), who had migrated to Delhi with her family due to financial hardship. Having dropped out of school, Nanki spent her days at the railway station, accompanying her mother at work and facing unsafe conditions. Her family, living in a small rented room in Paharganj, was unaware of how to re-enroll her in school or of the consequences of educational neglect.

A psychosocial assessment revealed that Nanki was shy, undernourished, and had significant learning gaps. SBT developed an intervention plan focusing on rebuilding her academic foundation, improving her health, and preparing her emotionally for formal schooling. Through regular counseling, non-formal education, and family support, Nanki gradually regained confidence and learning interest.

With steady progress, she was mainstreamed into Class 6 at a BMC school and continues to attend both school and the SBT centre regularly. Her academic performance and health have improved, and her family is now more involved in her education. Continued counseling and coordination among SBT, her school, and her family aim to ensure her sustained progress. Nanki's story reflects how timely outreach and structured support can transform the lives of vulnerable children through education.

Seeds of Hope: The Impact of Early Intervention

Eight-year-old Madhuri from Paharganj, New Delhi, was identified during an outreach by Salaam Baalak Trust (SBT). She spent most of her days at the New Delhi Railway Station with her mother, who worked there, while her father stayed in their native village. Financial struggles and lack of awareness had kept her out of school and exposed to unsafe surroundings.

A psychosocial assessment indicated that Madhuri was quiet and a slow learner, needing special attention. The SBT social worker provided counseling to her mother and enrolled Madhuri in the SBT centre for non-formal education. With individual support, she soon became more confident, engaged, and eager to learn.

Following a change in family circumstances, Madhuri returned to her village. However, motivated by her learning experience at SBT, her family ensured her enrollment in Class 2 at a local school. The family continues to stay in touch with the centre for guidance. Madhuri's journey demonstrates how early intervention, awareness, and parental involvement can create lasting educational impact, even beyond the city's boundaries.

Laxmi's Journey of Hope

Laxmi, a 12-year-old girl from a small informal settlement in Paharganj, New Delhi, was identified by Salaam Baalak Trust social workers during outreach at New Delhi Railway Station. She and her younger sister were found not enrolled in school and spending time in unsafe conditions as their mother worked as a laborer. Coming from a financially struggling migrant family, they were unaware of educational opportunities in the city.

A psychosocial assessment revealed Laxmi to be emotionally active, physically healthy, and quick to learn. Motivated by her interest in education, SBT enrolled her in the non-formal education program, providing consistent academic support and counseling to her and her family. Laxmi developed strong literacy skills and was successfully mainstreamed into Class 5 at a formal school.

She now regularly attends both school and the SBT centre, with ongoing monitoring and support. Laxmi's transformation from a street-connected child to a motivated student exemplifies how timely intervention and structured support can enable vulnerable children to access education and build a brighter future.

Overcoming Barriers: Kinjal's Path to Learning

Kinjal, a 7-year-old from an informal settlement in Paharganj, was identified during Salaam Baalak Trust's outreach at New Delhi Railway Station. With her speech impairment and shy nature, she initially struggled to adjust. Kinjal and her sister were not attending school and were unaware of educational opportunities due to their family's financial hardship after migrating to Delhi.

Following targeted counseling for Kinjal, her sister, and their mother, she was enrolled at the SBT non-formal education centre. Through patient support and a nurturing environment, Kinjal developed basic literacy skills, grew more confident, and displayed steady progress in learning. She was then successfully mainstreamed into Class 2 at a formal school, while continuing to attend the centre for ongoing academic and emotional guidance.

Kinjal's journey highlights the power of inclusive education, consistent support, and early intervention in helping vulnerable children with special needs thrive in school and beyond.



New Roots, New Dreams: Laxmi's Educational Beginning

Laxmi, a 12-year-old girl from a small informal settlement in Paharganj, New Delhi, was identified by Salaam Baalak Trust social workers during outreach at New Delhi Railway Station. She and her younger sister were found not enrolled in school and spending time in unsafe conditions as their mother worked as a laborer. Coming from a financially struggling migrant family, they were unaware of educational opportunities in the city.

A psychosocial assessment revealed Laxmi to be emotionally active, physically healthy, and quick to learn. Motivated by her interest in education, SBT enrolled her in the non-formal education program, providing consistent academic support and counseling to her and her family. Laxmi developed strong literacy skills and was successfully mainstreamed into Class 5 at a formal school.

She now regularly attends both school and the SBT centre, with ongoing monitoring and support. From Tracks to Triumph: Ramzan's Road to School

Ramzan, an 8-year-old boy from Madhya Pradesh, experienced severe hardship after migrating to Delhi with his family in search of better livelihood opportunities. Upon arrival, the family lost all their belongings at the railway station and was forced to live there for nearly two months without shelter or access to education. During this time, Ramzan remained out of school and had no exposure to formal or non-formal learning.

A social worker from Salaam Baalak Trust identified the family during outreach efforts and initiated counseling and support. When the father secured a job, the family moved to a nearby settlement providing some stability. Ramzan's psychosocial assessment revealed that he was emotionally confident, physically healthy, sociable, and cognitively sharp with a keen interest in learning.

Engaging the family on the importance of education, the social worker enrolled Ramzan in the Trust's Non-Formal Education centre. With consistent motivation and structured teaching, Ramzan quickly acquired foundational academic skills. He was soon mainstreamed into Class 2 at a formal school, where he continues to thrive. Ramzan enjoys attending both the school and the centre regularly, with his progress closely monitored and encouraged by the staff. This case highlights the transformative impact of timely intervention and sustained support. Ramzan's journey from living in crisis at a railway station to becoming a confident, regular schoolgoer exemplifies how education-focused outreach can help vulnerable children break the cycle of poverty and build brighter futures.



Pathway to Protection

On 15 December 2024, an 8-month-old girl named ABC was abandoned at the Old Delhi Railway Station. A man claiming guardianship asked a passerby to watch her while he purchased milk, but he never returned. The compassionate passenger cared for the child overnight, securing milk and diapers from a nearby Gurdwara, and promptly brought her to the Government Railway Police (GRP) at ODRS the next day.

The Salaam Baalak Trust team took over her care after she was found near the foot of the escalator at Platform No. 16 around 10:00 pm. Jointly with the GRP, the team initiated a thorough process including review of CCTV footage, filing a daily diary entry, medical examination at AAA Hospital, and informing the Child Welfare Committee (CWC III) at Sewa Kutir, Kingsway Camp. Although footage showed the child with a man, no family members have been traced. After complete documentation, the child was presented before the CWC, which ordered her placement at Palna Home, Kashmere Gate for care and protection.

This case exemplifies Salaam Baalak Trust's swift, compassionate response and robust child protection protocols ensuring vulnerable children receive safety, medical care, and legal protection while efforts continue to trace their families.

From Darkness to Hope

ABC, a 14-year-old girl from Kanchira, Raigarh, Chhattisgarh, ran away from her workplace due to violence and abuse, seeking safety under the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, 2012. A school dropout from the 6th grade, ABC was found at Old Delhi Railway Station on 9th February 2025 by the GRP Police. Initial interactions revealed her harrowing experience of being trafficked to Delhi by a relative under false promises of education, followed by sexual abuse by multiple perpetrators, forced labor, and ill-treatment at different locations.

After escaping, ABC sought help at the railway station and was brought to the GRP and Salaam Baalak Trust's Child Helpline Division (CHD). The team facilitated her medical examination, legal documentation, and night shelter at Udaan Girls Home. She was produced before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) at Kingsway Camp, which ordered her placement at Rose Udaan Home for ongoing care and protection. The CWC mandated counseling, medical care, and legal action. Follow-ups and reports have been submitted, with the case now under investigation at Model Town Police Station.

This case underscores the critical role of timely intervention, coordinated child protection efforts, and sustained support in rescuing and rehabilitating trafficked and vulnerable children, safeguarding their rights and dignity.



From Escape to Safety

ABC, a 16-year-old girl from Alauli, Ghagaria, Bihar, ran away due to a love affair, highlighting her vulnerability under the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, 2012. A school dropout from class 3, she lived with her family including her father, a teacher, siblings, and maternal relatives. Spotted at Old Delhi Railway Station with her boyfriend on 20th March 2025, the Salaam Baalak Trust team intervened after initial distress and confusion.

In detailed counseling, ABC shared her three-year relationship with the boy, and their flight from Ghagaria following familial opposition. Unaware of their travel plans, they had been wandering the station seeking guidance. The team facilitated contact with family members, coordinated with the authorities, and ensured their safety by admitting them to a shelter home following medical examination and legal documentation.

The Child Welfare Committee ordered ABC's placement at Nirmal Chaya Shelter Home, recommending in-depth counseling. The case has since been transferred for further legal proceedings at Khagaria Police Station. This case underscores the delicate balance between respecting adolescent relationships and ensuring protective care for vulnerable minors under legal frameworks like POCSO.


