Realising the dreams and needs of children is a daunting task; However, with continuous support of a large community of patrons and donors, Salaam Baalak Trust (SBT) has nurtured countless dreams.

An average 100 children arrive daily in the National Capital from across the country. The reasons are many- some have run away from physical abuse, some from sheer neglect and others in search of bright lights and hope for a better life. Each of them comes from difficult and dysfunctional circumstances in search of spaces which hold promises of happier times.

Living in the underbelly of the city, children from street situations become vulnerable to risks sexual abuse, economic exploitation, violence or drug abuse is the norm. Their needs of love, care, affection, quality education, nutrition and health remain distant dreams. We, at SBT, work towards fulfilling these needs - of giving children their rightful access to food, clothing, schooling and safes paces. Under the umbrella of Theatre Action Group (TAG), Nukkad, a street-based intervention programme; began working with street connected children in and around New Delhi Railway Station in 1987, which expanded into Salaam Baalak Trust once we registered it.

The Trust was established in December 1988 and provides support services for street and working children in National Capital Region.

Salaam Baalak Trust (Delhi) translates literally to a Trust that 'Salute a Child'. Saluting the indomitable spirit of the street children without any discrimination based on gender, religion, caste, colour or nationality lies at the heart of our work. Girls and Boys under the age of 18 years, living and working on the streets are welcomed at our centres. We 'salute' their resolve to live a life of dignity by providing them with the care and love, along with health, nutrition, education and vocational training facilities to fulfil their dreams.

Mission

SBT provides a sensitive and caring environment for street and working children, and those in difficult circumstances. It seeks to provide a platform for children to realise their full potential, their right to a safe and secure space, education, health and nutrition.





Vision

SBT aims at creating a nurturing environment that can foster the physical and mental growth of street and working children in difficult circumstances. The mission is to help children experience their childhood in a safe environment and turn their dreams into reality.





The Old Delhi Food walk-

The Old Delhi food walk is a unique English-guided tour, led by former street children and alumni of Salaam Baalak Trust. Our passionate team members undergo thorough training to become excellent local tour guides of the area around Chandni Chowk fabled for its street cusine. This program allows them to further develop their communication and soft skills too.





The walk is an unforgettable journey through the heart of Old Delhi, where our guests not only savour the delectable delicacies and culinary delights but also immerse themselves in the rich history of our vibrant city as our young guides walk them through the lenes of old Delhi.

The Food Walk culminates at the Jama Masjid Contact Point, which is one of Salaam Baalak Trust's dedicated day-care centers and thus serves to shed light on how children at risk in Old Delhi are supported by SBT.

Project - Children in street situation (CISS)

Nearly 70,000 children live on the streets of Delhi at any point of time. Of these, more than 40,000 children are engaged in begging, rag picking and selling knick- knacks on the streets. Their work is unrecognised and exploitative and they barely week out a survival on the unsafe environment of city streets.

They are deprived of adequate and appropriate adult protection, education and health care. To add to that, they face the persistent threat of trafficking, physical violence, substance abuse and sexual abuse on the streets. All these factors push these children to the bottom most layer of social hierarchy leaving them in a highly vulnerable position.




Salaam Baalak Trust in collaboration with The Delhi Commission for Protection of Child Rights (DCPCR), Youth Reach and PVR started a project, 'Rehabilitation of Children in Street Situations' with a mission to rehabilitate maximum CISS cases in a span of a year. As a part of the project, dedicated district-wise Project Officers have been deployed to identify and rehabilitate Children in street situations (CISS) in Delhi.

These Project Officers work closely with the CWCs and District Child Protection Units for ensuring the appropriate rehabilitation of these children and that each child in street situation is financially supported and is linked to already existing governmental schemes. We are currently working in North-East, South Delhi, South East and West Delhi district of Delhi.




Empowering minds through Education


The SBT program emphasizes education as an essential component for the holistic development of children. It extends beyond traditional classroom learning and incorporates activities such as sports, theatre, dance, and music. The primary goal is to educate children and equip them with the necessary skills to become productive members of society. All children, except those requiring emergency support only, are engaged in some form of education, including non-formal education, formal education in government or recognized private schools, or enrollment in the National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS).

A total of 1,012 children attended formal schools in the year 2022-23. Additionally, 4,090 children received non-formal education. Among them, 65 children were enrolled in National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS).

Furthermore, there are 31 children, including 22 girls, who are pursuing higher education and opted for streams such as B. Tech, Hotel Management, Graphic designing.







Children in higher Education

Every year, we ensure that children with an inclination towards higher education receive unwavering support to pursue their desired courses and fulfill their dreams. We prioritize empowering these children to make informed choices and provide them with the necessary resources to excel in their chosen fields. Details of the programme are as below-

Vocational Training and Skill Building




Our vision is to make children independent and self-reliant upon leaving our shelter home at the age of 18, we have an inhouse program that includes career counseling. This program assess the children's interests and provides them with the necessary skills and guidance to pursue a career path that aligns with their strengths and aspirations.

Once the children reach the age of 16, we initiate the career counseling process. This involves conducting individual assessments and discussions with each child to identify their interests, aptitudes, and goals. We take into consideration their academic background, personal preferences, and any previous experiences or skills they may have acquired.

Our aim is to empower the children to make informed decisions about their future and equip them with the necessary skills to succeed in their chosen fields.

This year, 204 children were enrolled in vocational training and skill building courses, including drawing and dance classes. Among them, 148 were girls.

Out of the total, 52 children (25 girls) have secured employment as receptionists, housekeepers, cooks, and similar positions. The remaining children are continuing their vocational courses which were of a higher duration as they have not reached 18 years of age yet.




Medical Programme



SBT provides comprehensive healthcare services to children living and working on the streets. These services include:

Nutrition:

SBT ensures that children receive well-balanced and hot cooked meals at residential centers and contact points. The meals are prepared in a hygienic manner under the supervision of staff members. Children with special nutritional needs, such as those suffering from diseases like Tuberculosis and malnutrition, receive specialized nutrition. This may include protein supplements, extra servings of fruits, and milk as recommended by the doctor.



Regular Doctor Visits:


SBT has a committed medical team that includes a fulltime physician. The homes and contact points where the children live and work receive regular monthly doctor visits. This allows for the identification and treatment of any health issues or concerns that the children may have.

Need-based Care and Treatment:

Children receive need-based care and treatment as required. This means that they receive appropriate medical attention and interventions based on their specific health conditions.






Mental Health Programme-

In 2003, SBT implemented a comprehensive Mental Health Programme (MHP) led by Dr. Amit Sen, a renowned child psychiatrist. The MHP team consists of qualified counsellors dedicated to addressing the psychological needs of children both in the children homes and at contact points. We have a team of 10 qualified psychologist and 3 consultant Psychiatrists.

The programme incorporates a referral system, where staff members refer children experiencing emotional and psychological difficulties to the counsellors. The referred children undergo thorough clinical and psychological assessments. Specialized therapies like cognitive behavior therapy, art-based therapy, play therapy, and group therapy are used to help children dealing with serious issues such as trauma or depression. Additionally, regular sessions are conducted with each child, not just limited to referred cases.

47 individuals were referred for mental health issues including depression, interpersonal issues, ADHD, Autism, and other related conditions. Additionally, 38 children were referred for drug deaddiction services.





Salaam Citywalk 🖁

The Salaam Baalak Trust City Walk offers a distinctive and meaningful experience for visitors in Delhi. Unlike typical guided tours, this initiative is led by former street children who have undergone comprehensive training to become local guides. The primary goal of the City Walk is to enhance the communication and speaking skills of these adolescents while allowing their stories to be heard and providing a glimpse into their world through their perspective.

The tour takes approximately two hours and explores the streets of Paharganj and the surrounding area near New Delhi Railway Station. As the guides themselves were once living and working on the streets, the tour holds a special and personal significance to them. Participants of the City Walk can expect to venture beyond the usual tourist spots and discover lesser-known attractions in Delhi even as they learn about the survival instincts of street children and the hardships they face.

The Citywalk has garnered popularity among tourists and its economic viability has ensured its continuity. By participating in the tour, visitors not only gain an unforgettable experience but also contribute to empowering and reintegrating several children into mainstream society. This year, there were 2019 visitors from across the globe who took the walk.




After Care program

After reaching the age of 18, a child's association with SBT doesn't come to an end; it continues with ongoing support and care. Legally a child moves on to being an adult at 18, but they are far from being equipped to lead an independent life. We extends financial support to individuals to pursue further education and provide housing facilities in our After care home.

Last year, 15 boys who turned 18 were offered residential support in our aftercare home.

Even after rehabilitation, regular communication is maintained with the young adults through monthly telephonic contacts to understand their current needs and provide any required assistance.








Let's embark on a journey through the remarkable accomplishments of our children across diverse fields, including arts, education, and more.

- Two children took part in the film "Weight of Light," and twelve children participated in the movie "Braid.




The Trust strives to provide a safe haven for children in Delhi-NCR, with a total of seven residential homes, five for boys and two for girls.

Each home serves a unique purpose, catering to the specific needs of children. Three of the homes are open shelters for boys, offering them a short-term stay, providing care and support. On the other hand, the remaining four homes are children's homes, offering long-term living arrangement, giving the children a loving and stable environment to call their own.

These spaces are more than just shelters; they are opportunities for children to experience joy, safety, and care while they embark on their journey to a brighter future.

In these homes, children find not just a roof over their heads, but also compassionate mentors and caregivers who nurture their growth and well-being. Salaam Baalak Trust embraces each child's unique story, providing them with a chance to heal from past traumas and build a foundation for a better life.



Aasra Children Home for Boys

Aasra Children Home for Boys, located at Najafgarh, Dwarka, is an inclusive center that can accommodate up to 50 children. The center provides essential services such as education, mental health support, and medical facilities to ensure the well-being of the children.

The DMRC Children's Home, located in Tis Hazari, is the largest home being run by SBT and can accommodate up to 120 children. This home provides a safe and secure environment for the children, equipped with all the basic facilities they require. Additionally, the home features amenities such as a library, computer rooms, and a playground, ensuring a well-rounded experience for the children.


The DMRC took the initiative to establish the DMRC Children's Home when they felt the need to help alleviate the hardships faced by the children living on the streets nearby. During the construction of the Delhi Metro in the Tis Hazari area Mr. E. Sreedharan, the former Managing Director of Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC), was deeply impacted on seeing so many kids on the streets. In line with DMRC's commitment to corporate social responsibility, they took built a child-friendly home and handed it over to SBT to run.



Apnaghar Open Shelter

Apna Ghar, established in 2003, is situated in the heart of Paharganj. This centre serves as a temporary haven for children in need, offering a safe space for their short-term stay. With the capacity to accommodate up to 35 children, Apna Ghar extends its support to those who have fled from various cities to Delhi or have been rescued from exploitative circumstances such as child labor or trafficking cases. Children find solace within these walls, where they can reside for a maximum duration of six months, as they receive the necessary care and assistance to rebuild their lives or go back home.

Contact Points and Community Outreach

At SBT, our work extends beyond the confines of homes as we actively engage with strategic locations in Delhi, including New Delhi Railway Station, Hanuman Mandir, and the communities of Seelampur and Shastri Park. These areas are critical touchpoints where vulnerable children often seek refuge after running away from home or facing challenges in accessing education due to limited community support.

Our unique approach to each contact point and community outreach involves tailored interventions to address the specific needs of the children and communities we serve.



Kishalaya (Hanuman Mandir) Contact Point

Kishalaya, located near the Bangla Sahib Gurudwara at Connaught Place, serves as a contact point for various community services. One of their primary initiatives is a day care center that caters to the educational and medical needs of children living on the streets or residing in rain baseras (night shelters). In addition to providing a nutritious lunch, the center also strives to enroll these children in formal schools.

Encouraging parents to send their children to school poses a significant challenge, as many parents rely on their children's income from selling balloons to support the family. However, the dedicated team at Kishalaya consistently works at gaining the trust of these parents. They understand the importance of education and work tirelessly to convince parents about the long-term benefits it can bring to their children's lives.

Furthermore, Kishalaya also tackles the issue of drug addiction among children. Helping children overcome this addiction demands great perseverance and determination. The team at Kishalava engages with these children, providing support and guidance to break free from the grips of drug addiction. They employ various strategies to rehabilitate these children, acknowledging the immense challenges involved in this process.

Overall, Kishalaya is committed to transforming the lives of vulnerable children, providing them with essential education, healthcare, and a chance to break free from the cycle of poverty and addiction. Through their unwavering dedication, they strive to create a brighter future for these children and their families.

GRP and Platform Contact Point

GRP is located at the bustling New Delhi Railway Station. This railway station acts as a central hub for children who have run away from their small cities, arriving in Delhi with dreams of starting a new life filled with hope and optimism. However, the stark reality often differs from their initial aspirations. To address this issue, our outreach team begins their work early in the morning, diligently visiting the trains and searching for children who have either run away from home, been abandoned, are lost, or are victims of trafficking.

Our primary goal is to ensure the safety and well-being of these vulnerable children. For those who can be reunited with their families, we work tirelessly to facilitate their return. However, for those who cannot be immediately reunited, we collaborate with residential homes in Delhi to provide them with a secure and nurturing environment. These homes are designed to offer a sense of stability, care, and protection, along with access to education, healthcare, and emotional support.

Mobile School

Every day at approximately 10 am, our bus arrives at Shastri Park, ready to embark on its outreach work and gather children from the community for non-formal classes. Our dedicated team is committed to teaching and motivating these children, with a particular emphasis on encouraging the education of girls and boys. Alongside this educational support, we also provide regular mental health and medical interventions, ensuring that a doctor and psychologist visit regularly.

In the second half of the day, our bus moves to the Seelampur spot, where classes commence. We have observed that a majority of the children attending these classes are girls, this reflects the positive impact of our continuous efforts. As a result of our interventions, numerous children from the community are now pursuing higher education. Additionally, we have facilitated the enrollment of children in vocational training programs, enabling families to take the first step towards an independent life.






Established in 1998 by the Ministry of Women and Child Development (MWCD), Childline stands as a pioneering 24-hour national helpline for children in distress. This initiative, in collaboration with Salaam Baalak Trust (SBT), provides immediate assistance to children facing risks. Whether it be abuse, exploitation, forced labor, or physical injuries, Childline-Salaam Baalak Trust is just a phone call away. Those affected children or concerned citizens can dial the toll-free number 1098 to seek help.

The Childline team promptly responds to these calls and intervenes in the most effective manner to assist the children in need. The service is available across Delhi, with three dedicated Childlines located in Central District, New Delhi District, and Old Delhi Railway Station. Through this vital helpline, vulnerable children receive the support and care they deserve to ensure their well-being and safety.



Policy and Advocacy (2022-23)

SBT actively engages in direct programs with children while simultaneously advocating for children's rights. Major advocacy efforts in the current year include the following:

- Executive Council Members and Azim Premji Foundation (APF) project coordinator and staff visited Patna, Biha. It was a networking visit to better the restoration follow up program. They met with Director, Dept. Of WCD, District Child Protection Unit, Delhi Commission for Protection of Child Rights (DCPCR) and Child Welfare Committee.
- State level consultation and stakeholder meeting was organized at IIC in August 2023 with DCPCR and CWC.
- EC participated in a meeting organized for the project 'Children in street situation' at DCPCR.
- EC participated in a national level meeting on 'Compendium on family strengthening and alternative care program practiced across India in July.
- Mr.Nageshwar Rao, Justice, Supreme Court and Mr.Gaurav Agrawal gave a talk on street children in India where members of a few NGO- Jamghat, Chetna, Haque, SBT and Butterflies were invited.
- EC attended the National consultation on child participation in care intervention, organized by Rainbow in Hyderabad.
- EC attended a National Director meet on annual review organized by CIF in March.
 EC attended meeting on 'Safeguarding our children and their future' organized by Children International at Crown Plaza, Delhi in March.
- EC and a Coordinator visited Sathi and We live foundation in Bangalore on 18th March.
 More than 25 SBT children are associated with both the organization.

Case Studies

Sana's journey of Resilience and Achievement

From the lanes of the Inderlok slum area to her current position as an executive in a Bangalorebased IT company, Sana (name changed) has traversed a remarkable distance. Her journey began in 2014 when she and her sister Muntasha, who was only 5 at the time, were rescued from an risky home situation after the untimely demise of their father and their mother's battle with HIV.

Despite the challenging circumstances, Sana displayed remarkable determination and resilience. Upon joining our organization, she and her sister were immediately enrolled in formal schooling. Throughout her academic journey, Sana has consistently excelled, proving to be a well-behaved and disciplined student. A significant milestone in her educational journey was her outstanding performance in Class X.

When she turned 18, there were challenges with her continued stay, but recognizing her immense potential and remarkable academic achievements, we decided to extend educational support to her. Currently, Sana is doing her Class XII exams via NIOS, while also working as an executive at a prestigious IT company in Bangalore.

Sana aspires to pursue a university education in Mass Communication. By next year, she hopes to make this transition and further enhance her knowledge and skills in the field.

We are proud to be a part of her journey and are confident that she will continue to shine brightly in her future endeavors.



From Dreams to Reality

Meet Khushboo (name changed), a determined 20-year-old girl residing with her family in Shastri Park. Life hasn't been easy for them, as her father works as an E-Rickshaw driver, and their financial situation is challenging. With three siblings, two of them studying in government schools, the burden on the family's finances was significant.

Khushboo had a desire to pursue higher education, but her family's financial constraints hindered her dreams. However, the mobile school team managed to convince her mother to consider further studies for Khushboo. Although her father was initially hesitant, a heartfelt conversation with him eventually led to his approval for her to pursue Vocational Training.

Khushboo decided to enroll in a Beautician's course. After completing the course, she envisioned running her own beauty parlor. With continuous support from the SBT team, Khushboo successfully established and now runs her thriving parlor.

Her efforts contribute significantly to her family's financial stability. Her determination and hard work have proven that with the right support and guidance, dreams can become a reality, even in the face of adversity.



Breaking Barriers

Harshit (name changed) comes from a family with six siblings, unfortunately, three of whom have passed away. His father earns a living as a rickshaw puller, while his mother collects garbage in Meena Bazar.

Life in Urdu Park is challenging for Harshit's family, especially during the rainy season when they have to cover their belongings with a tarpaulin to protect everything. To support their family financially, the siblings engage in the collection of junk and sometimes resort to begging.

Fortunately, an intervention by the staff of Parvaaz Jama Masjid has brought positive changes to Harshit's life. The staff found Harshit while he was collecting junk iron to sell and started talking to him and his parents about the opportunities available at their center. Initially hesitant, after consistent efforts and conversations, Harshit's parents agreed to send him to the center. Since then, Harshit's life has transformed for the better.

Upon joining the center, Harshit received basic education on maintaining hygiene and cleanliness. He was also enrolled in Non-Formal Education (NFE) classes to learn how to read and write. Additionally, he actively participates in various activities, including games and life skills education. Regular medical checkups have also been conducted to ensure his well-being.

Harshit has made remarkable progress and has developed a keen interest in learning, can read newspapers, and even performs basic math calculations. He has also started reading in English, showcasing his eagerness to acquire new skills.

The positive impact of the center's intervention goes beyond education. Through their assistance, Harshit was able to undergo an essential squint eye operation at Shroff Hospital. Moreover, with the center's guidance and support, Harshit has abandoned begging altogether.

Looking ahead, the process of Harshit's admission to the center for the upcoming year is set to continue his journey of growth and development.

Jyoti and Raja's Journey from Vulnerability to Safety

A few months ago, there were two vulnerable siblings named Jyoti (10 years old) and Raja (09 years old) who were found at New Delhi Railway Station (NDRS). These poor children were deprived of basic needs such as education, clothing, and shelter, and they were living on the streets, exposed to various dangers and abuses.

A dedicated team of SBT workers went to meet the children's mother, who was living in a desperate situation, resorting to begging to survive. She shared that her husband had abandoned her and the children, leaving them in dire circumstances.

The SBT team empathetically motivated the mother to consider sending her children to GRP for non-formal education (NFE) classes. Initially, she was hesitant and apprehensive about the idea, but as the children started attending the center and making progress in their learning, she began to feel a sense of happiness and satisfaction.

Gradually, the SBT team informed the mother about child care institutions. They sensitized her about the functioning of various CCI (Child Care Institutions) and how they could provide her children with a quality life and essential facilities for their overall development. Though she was worried about not being able to see her children again, the team assured her that the children

would be taken care of and that it was the best option for their future.

After many persistent efforts, the SBT team successfully convinced the CWC (Child Welfare Committee) to approve the long-term placement of the children at the CCI. On 14th September 2022, both the children were placed in a shelter home.

In the follow-up visits, the mother saw her children thriving at their respective shelter homes, where they were happy, playing, learning, and living in a safe and dignified environment, and was glad of the decision she had taken.



Meet Amar, the inspiring Project Manager at Decathlon, Delhi-N.C.R

Amar's early life was marked by hardships and adversity. At the young age of 7, he had to start working at a mechanic shop due to his family's financial struggles. To escape from the extreme physical and emotional abuse by his stepmother, he made the difficult decision to run away from his hometown, Raipur, and headed to New Delhi.

Life in the metro city was far from easy for Amar, and he resorted to working as a rag picker and pickpocketing to make ends meet. To cope with the hunger and difficulties, he turned to drugs. However, fate took a positive turn when an outreach worker noticed Amar at the New Delhi Railway Station and offered him a chance to live in a shelter home where he could receive education and support.

Excited about the prospect of getting an education and a safe environment, Amar eagerly accepted the offer and enrolled in class 5th at Apna Ghar open shelter. Despite facing a setback due to being diagnosed with Bone Tuberculosis, which took two years to recover from, Amar's determination to achieve his dreams remained unwavering. He persevered through all odds, studied diligently, and successfully cleared all his exams.

Amar's hard work and resilience paid off, and he is now working as a Project Manager for Decathlon in Delhi-N.C.R. Additionally, he is pursuing his graduation through distance learning while nurturing his aspirations to become an entrepreneur.

Amar's journey is a testament to the power of determination, resilience, and the transformative impact of education and support in overcoming life's challenges and achieving one's goals.
